Questions

- A. PPP is a fairly new delivery model for our large hospitals and networks. When and how do we analyze its success outside of the PPP model?

We need to analyze success not only terms of the narrow stakeholders involved in PPP but from a broader perspective. Contractor's success does not equate to Miinsitry's success.

Risk transfer are contractual arrangements. How to look at tying clinical risks or outcomes to the project.

Proponent members to interact with end users. How do we synthesize this into a model to shift the ppp model?

What are the evaluation criteria? What are the Post Occupancy Evaluation Tools and how can we define the terms of the evaluation to integrate these values?

- B. What would we do to shift this model, aligning more closely with societal, urban and architectural aspirations knowing the rapidly changing complexion of healthcare?

P3 process does not always support innovation. How do you incentivize innovation?

Owner / User interface pushes towards exemplar design instead of indicative design.

Increase facetime between opponents for the evaluation teams.

Introduce design competitions into the process.

Recommendation support a hybrid of P3 and negotiated contracts.
